The Purpose of Masonry?

But listen closely.....the success of a Lodge of Freemasons can't be computed in sheer numbers, in the number of degrees we confer, or in proficiency in the ritualistic work. Oh, they are indeed good milestones on the road to success, but Masonry can't offer something that must first be found in the heart. It begins there and when properly explored and expanded will indeed take us, and our Lodge, to paths of undreamed of success. I believe we, as a Lodge are traveling the right path, but now ask yourself...are you ready?...What came ye here to do?
