So, let us pledge our loyalty to this great flag that expresses the will of a free people. Let us be obedient to everything it represents; our country's laws, the authority of our constitution, and a true recognition of the right of every human being to enjoy life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

Remember that as you recite the pledge allegiance to our flag we are honoring and saying thank you to every person who has suffered and died directly or indirectly for our country. They helped make our country great through their sacrifice. Let us preserve and defend the Stars and Stripes at home and abroad, and leave unsullied a priceless heritage for future generations of Americans. Now, more than ever before, may God Bless America!
